

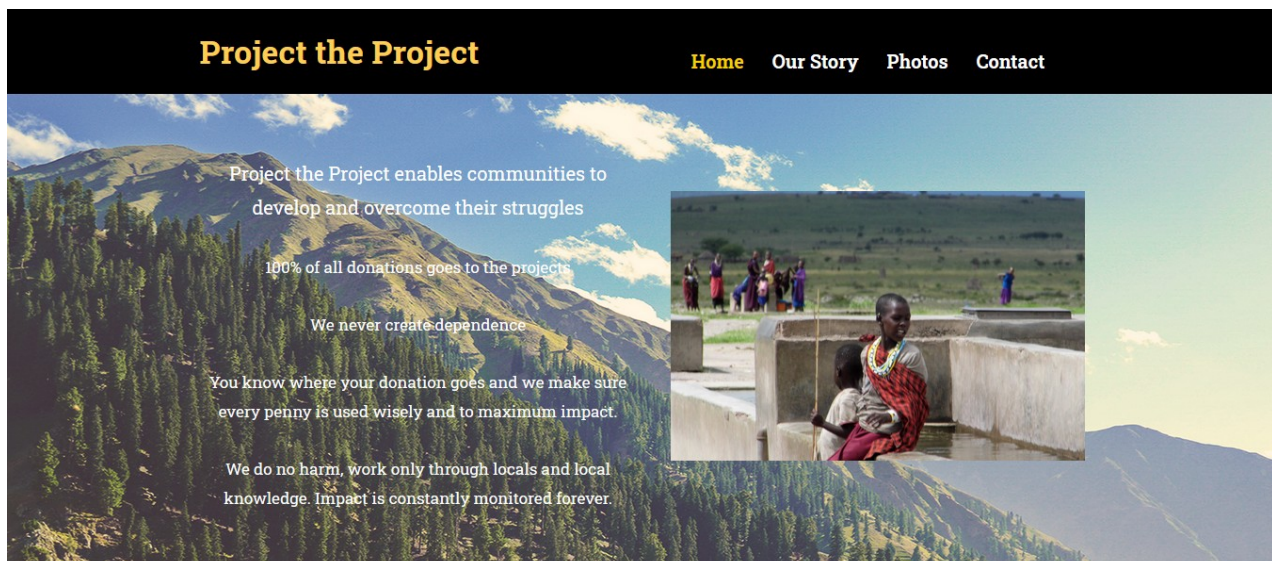
Hello!

The situation in Africa is currently varied from country to country and still very changeable.

Tanzania

President Magufuli has stopped releasing data as he says the figures caused panic and that the tests were faulty. He has opened the borders again and is encouraging tourists to return with no quarantine measures.

At a recent church gathering, Magufuli said further lockdown would be disastrous to the economy and the people.

Tourism minister Hamisi Kigwangalla, said last week that around ¾ of those employed in tourism will lose jobs from Covid-19 effects and that the number of tourists expected will be down 76 percent this year.

Dependence on tourism makes the whole economy precarious – not only for the guides, hotel staff, conservation workers and aviation industry but also the small and independent traders and artisans who will face a summer with no foreign currency and an uncertain future. Most people in low paid work live hand to mouth, have no employment rights and no state benefits system.

The markets are open again now but many people are afraid to return to public places. Most people rely on public gatherings for income- buses are always packed to far above capacity, markets are vast, school classrooms are full, the poorest have to go out to buy and sell every day just to get by.



We delivered large and sanitised safe food and soap packs to three cut off tribal regions and a further delivery when lockdown was extended. I don't think they would have survived without it. The recipients are hugely grateful for the emergency aid and pledge for ongoing support.

The Masai communities send you their thanks!

We now plan to help these villages gain better food and income security. We will resume building the goat security pen, started before lockdown, when deemed safe and to get advice and protection about maize and bean growing. Goat trading pays

for the school and a protected area to grow maize and beans will prevent damage from the environment and allow greater food security and better nutrition for the future.

Uganda

To date, Uganda has registered no virus related deaths. Dr Monica Musenero, a senior presidential advisor on epidemics says that the country is yet to feel the impact of the disease;

“People have not yet felt this disease because we locked down early. But that does not mean that we are safe. We are not safe. With community cases being reported, we are about to experience what COVID-19 really is,”

The World Health Organisation (WHO) warned on Monday that the virus is not close to being over. Scientists warn that the certain parts of the world like Africa that are nearing the 400,000 reported case mark are yet to experience the worst. Case modelling that has been carried out by WHO shows that as many as 40 million people could be infected on the continent.

PTP has been part of a collaborative program in rural Uganda to help those most in need during the crisis so far. This involved equipping a hospital to cope with Covid cases and getting food to families. We will continue to work with the wider program to help prevent poverty and malnutrition in the future.



We still have a lot to do. Our aim is always to bring greater fairness and equality of opportunity to those who have been dealt a poorer hand in life.

We have received many requests and proposals. Everything is carefully scrutinised and we can only do what we can afford and we keep costs to a minimum. Every penny you donate makes a difference.
